Registration and Punctuality

As you know, it makes a massive difference to children's learning if they arrive at school on time. Arriving even a few minutes late can set them off badly for the whole day.


At the Infant School We hope you have had time to read the '10 to 9' leaflet we circulated this week and that this has made the purpose of the 10 to 9 session really clear. However the day starts for your child, we hope bags and coats can be sorted, last goodbyes said so that by 9.00am EVERY child is sat quietly to be registered.

At the Junior School We are trialling a new automated system at the Junior School that will send you a text if your child is not in school for registration and you have not told us they will not be in. Due to this, if your child arrives at school late it is essential that they tell the office they are with us.

At the Junior School children are late if they arrive after 8.40am. If they arrive after 8.50am this counts as an unauthorised absence.

Please add to your New Year Resolution list **'I will get my child to school on time every day'**.

Since 2008 over 500 million Christmas cards have been collected by the public through the Woodland Trust Christmas Card Recycling Scheme – helping to plant over 245,500 trees. Federation staff will take our cards to special card collection bins until January 31st, so there is still time to bring them in.
