New topic 'Hooks'

At the start of each half term the teachers have planned a 'hook' activity to engage the children in their new topic.

This half term:

Y3 are learning about our amazing body, and will be spending some time in the School Woods to think about how they would survive in the wilderness – including building a shelter and a campfire

Y4 have taken a trip to the Quay to inspire their 'Rivers' topic. They sketched local landmarks and learnt about the Quay's place in the history of Exeter

Y5 have taken part in a WWII interactive workshop, including learning how to use Morse Code, reflecting on evacuation, and hearing just how loud and scary an air raid siren was.

Y6 are studying the Paralympics, and as well as watching lots of inspirational footage, have taken part in a variety of Paralympic sports. They will be doing more of this as the term goes on.
