Keeping Safe

Assemblies in both schools regularly feature reminders to children about how to stay safe.

This week at the Junior School the children enjoyed a keeping safe quiz and on a weekly basis engage with real life personal, social and health scenarios through the '1Decision' resources which includes media clips to provoke thought and discussion

At the Infant and Nursery School one of the many ways children learn how to stay safe is through story, song and conversations about staying with their grown up when they are out and about. Plus using Kelso's choice of course!

Across the Federation we ensure that all the adults children come into contact to are 'safe' as well. Our volunteers undergo initial volunteer training and a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check. Volunteers now need to be present in school on a regular (3 monthly) basis in order for their DBS to remain current. So please if you are, and wish to remain a volunteer, read the posters around the schools with information regarding short volunteering opportunities.

Partnership Working

Our schools have been working together in a close partnership for a number of years. We believe that this has had a really positive impact on the quality of provision we offer to our children and their families. We learn from each other, share ideas and try to make sure everyone gets the best out of working together.

We also work with other schools across the city to share what we do and learn form other people, for example, we are enthusiastic members of the Exeter Consortium and Teaching School Alliance, and take part in regular activities where we make sure that our teachers are kept up to date with the most current thinking about teaching and learning.

Over the next 12 months, as we focus upon our Federation improvement activities we will be working alongside Topsham Primary, Pinhoe Primary, and the Ladysmith Federation.

This new partnership will give us the opportunity to **share and learn** in a wider group of a manageable size. We will keep you up to date with the positive changes that will happen as a result.

To make it easy to see the children write this on blue (cold) paper.

After lots of input from the teacher the children complete the same task again, this time on gold or pink (warm) paper. This way we can see easily the progress they have made.

Year 4 have just finished their latest piece of warm writing, and the children and teachers would love it if you have the time to come in and have a look at their fabulous stories and see how much their writing has improved – just drop in before or after school and you'll see what a great job they've done.
