
Let's Practise at Home

Can the sentence you write be turned from a statement to a command to a question?



2. Word of the day.


Learn how to say it, spell it, it's definition, put it in a sentence, earn 'points' everytime you use it (in the right context), find it in a book?

Writing a good sentence




Target: to write for different purposes/reasons.
