English

Writing

Q. How much time do Y1 children spend on English in school each week?

We teach phonics daily for 20 minutes.

Mathematics

We use Hamilton maths to plan teaching and learning in this subject. In response to the Covid19 pandemic and parents finding themselves Home Schooling Hamilton have prepared great FREE online maths learning activities. If you use the link and go to <u>Year 1 Maths Week 1</u> it will provide you with everything you need. In addition there is also a link to Education City. We appreciate that you may not be able to do everything but why not mix and match between Hamilton and Education City as time and mood allows.

Q. How much time do Y1 children spend on maths in school each week?

Maths lessons in school at this time of the year are x4 per week of about 50 minutes. We hope that this will be supported by x3 sessions of 15 minutes Home Learning on Education City.

The great thing about using Hamilton with your child is that we use it in school so they are already familiar with the images and language. Good luck!

Dinosaur Diets

Learning: To know what herbivores, carnivores and omnivores are.
