A Learning Letter\from Nursery

Welcome to the Nursery

A very warm welcome to our 4 new children and their families. These children are already busy exploring all the areas and activities available to them in the Nursery. We are very proud of and must congratulate our 'old' children on the way they are supporting the new children. They have been extremely kind, caring and helpful and are a credit to you and our Nursery.

The children are showing a real interest in animals and we will be developing this curiosity by learning lots of exciting facts. Look out for these around the Nursery environment. As always with our projects we never know quite where the children's interest will take us or how long the project will last. Please let us know if your child has any particular animal interests that they express at home. We would love for them to bring in photographs or information about any pets that they have.

Learning in the Nursery

The children have been using colour as a vehicle to study, explore and experiment with different techniques. They have learnt how to mix watercolour paints, ensuring that they always have two pots of water – one to get the paint off and one to thoroughly clean their brush. This ensures that the colours they are mixing are bold and vibrant. Laura Jane is now teaching the children how to create a tile for printing. It takes concentration and time and the children have been so excited with the images that they have created. Why not pop into the studio to have a go!

Number and counting

This term we will be focusing on counting accurately using 1:1 correspondence – this means counting one item at a time without missing one and counting every object just once. The strategies the children have been learning are to place items in a line so that they don't get in a muddle when counting and moving objects as they count them. We are also counting forwards and backwards in ones up to 10.

In addition, the children are being encouraged to use mathematical language to compare size and to describe shapes and patterns.

<u>Listen to:</u> Different pieces of music together and talk about how they make you feel.

<u>Visit:</u> The library and look for non-fiction books on animals
