Keeping us updated

Please make sure you let us know as early in the morning as possible if your child will not be in school for the day. We have to speak to someone if a child is not in school and we haven't heard from you there have been two recent cases in the press elsewhere in the country where schools didn't, with tragic consequences. If you don't contact us it can mean our office staff spending a lot of time ringing, texting, and emailing all of a child's contacts to find out where they are, which is not a good use of school resources.

It would really help us if you let us know about any changes to your contact details, especially if you get a new telephone number. It's hard for children if they're unwell and we can't get in touch with you.

The Stoke Hill World Cup of Books

Over the last few weeks the Junior School children have been taking part in the first ever Stoke Hill World Cup of Books. Miss Byett led the School Council in finding out the school's top 16 books, nominated by children from every class.

The books were split into 4 groups, and votes took place to find the top 2 from each group. We then had two knockout rounds, before the grand final between 'Harry Potter' and 'Diary of a Wimpy Kid'. The final count was 52% Harry Potter, 48% Wimpy Kid, meaning that Harry Potter is the very first winner of the Stoke Hill World Cup of Books!

We carried out the World Cup to bring the children's attention to books that other people like. We also wanted to help the children understand the power of voting and the importance of having their say, as well as realising that their vote might not always be on the winning side. A huge 'thank you' to Miss Byett and our wonderful School Council for organising everything, and to 6B for counting all the votes.

The other semi-finalists were 'The Demon Dentist' and 'The Brilliant World of Tom Gates'. Tom Gates narrowly missed out on the final, losing against Harry Potter by only 8 votes.
